Fr Daniel writes:

There is the general perception that one of the first things Jesus did in his public ministry was to call his apostles. The understanding, therefore, is that the apostles did not know much about Jesus when they were called.

In Luke's gospel, however, there is a small nuance. Jesus did perform a significant number of miracles before calling his first apostles. In the Gospel passage we heard last Sunday Jesus visited his hometown, and people initially welcomed him because of the things he had done in Capernaum (Lk 4:23).

Strangely enough, Luke does not say what exactly happened in Capernaum, so chances are that he had a lapsus in his story line – but let's keep that between you and me. After his visit to Nazara, he goes (again) to Capernaum, where, among other things, he heals the mother-in-law of Peter (Lk 4: 38-39). But he heals many others too, so many, in fact, that the following day the whole town is looking for him (Lk 4: 40-44).

This Sunday however, after all the things Jesus had already done, we find him preaching to a great multitude, while Peter is somewhere in the background cleaning his nets. Maybe he wasn't impressed with the healing of his mother-in-law, but what about all the other healings and exorcisms Jesus had performed in his presence? How come Peter looks so cold, distant and uninterested in Jesus's presence?

Bearing in mind that Luke is the only one who presents the events in this order, we must assume that he was making a point. And my theory (and not only mine) is this: Peter had not experienced that Jesus was there for him yet. Surely, everyone was benefitting from the miracles of Jesus, but really and truly Peter had not benefited yet. That is why Jesus's presence meant so little to him, and why he was more interested in cleaning the nets and in entertaining his own thoughts, exhausted and frustrated after a long night, because despite his expertise and many efforts, they had caught nothing.

But Jesus noticed that they had caught nothing, and he noticed that Peter is frustrated and exhausted. So Jesus asks him, to put out into the deep waters. There were other fishermen with him, at least another three, but this time he asks Peter because Jesus wants Peter to realise that he was there for him too. It was enough for Peter to see his nets full of fish, to understand that he had been wrong all this time. Now he knows that Jesus loves him too. Now he knows God had eyes for him too.

But there is more, because oddly enough, now that they have the greatest catch of fish of their entire career, they leave everything. And in that way Luke was leaving another message for us. That miracles are only instruments. Peter did not really need the fish, just like we don't need a lot of the things we want. Peter only needed one thing: a proof that God loved him.

COMBONI SISTERS 150th ANNIVERSARY OF FOUNDATION – 2022 is the Sisters' sesquincentenary being founded in Verona in 1872 for mission in Africa. Various celebratory events are planned for London and Chiswick including a Mass and Reception on a Thames cruiser emulating the journey of the first Sisters accompanied by the then Fr Daniel Comboni up the River Nile to the interior of Africa. Firstly, however, the jubilee year will be launched in the parish this Sunday 6th Feb when we will hear a word from one of the Sisters after all Masses.
